How to Find Your Great Philly School

We believe that every student in Philadelphia should have access to a great school. This guide and GreatPhillySchools.org are presented through the collaboration of several nonprofit partners, led by the Philadelphia School Partnership, so that parents, caregivers and students can find, compare and demand great schools.

The site and this guide contain school details and contact information — as well as performance data covering academics, school incidents and student engagement — for over 400 elementary, middle and high schools. You'll also find articles on different types of schools and factors families should consider when choosing one.

Our school ratings were developed with families in mind and are a tool to help families more easily research and compare schools. The ratings should be used to identify schools that deserve a closer look. Keep in mind that every student has different learning needs, so there is no one school that is best for every student.

Philadelphia needs more great school options; however, there are many great schools you might not be aware of. We are here to help you find the best fit for your family.

What Is a "Great" School?

There are many types of great schools, but they all have some things in common. At GreatPhillySchools, we believe that in a great school, students are:

Learning and achieving. Students are in classrooms with effective teachers who are supported by a strong leader. The adults are responsible for the achievement of all students, and they ensure that all students are learning. They make it a priority to help students who are struggling. At a minimum, students in a great school are performing on grade level in math and reading.

Safe. A strong culture and a positive climate encourage learning. Families should feel comfortable sending their child to school every day. At a minimum, there should be few incidents at a school.

Engaged. Students are engaged in their education, and families are committed and involved. The principal, teachers and staff communicate with families and welcome their involvement in the school. Students like going to school and pay attention to what their teachers and classmates are saying. At a minimum, students are coming to school every day.

Graduating and going on to college. A great school prepares students to graduate from high school and continue their education at two- or four-year colleges and vocational schools.

Growing. All students, no matter where they started, are growing and making substantial gains. At a minimum, the academic performance of students at the school is moving in a positive direction each year.

What Our Ratings Tell You

GreatPhillySchools ratings are designed to help you get started and decide what questions to ask when visiting a school. We rate schools in the following categories, ranging from 1 for the lowest-performing to 10 for the highest-performing.

Academics — Math: Measures student performance on state and/or national math tests.

Academics — **Reading:** Measures student performance on state and/or national reading tests.

Academics – Science: Measures student performance on state and/or national science tests and is not factored into a school's Overall rating.

Incidents: Measures the number of reported incidents in a school for every 100 students. A higher School Incidents rating means that the school reported few or no incidents.

Attendance: Measures the number of students who attended 95% or more of enrolled instructional days.

College Bound (High Schools Only): Measures the percentage of high school graduates enrolled in a post-secondary institution in the first fall following their high school graduation.

Overall: Combined Math and Reading ratings and at least two of the following ratings: Incidents, Attendance and College Bound (High Schools Only).

High Growth : Highlights schools that have shown significant academic growth over a three-year period in both math and reading, as measured by the Pennsylvania Value Added Assessment System (PVAAS). This is not considered a rating and is therefore not factored into the Overall rating.

Some Schools Don't Have Ratings

You may notice that some schools do not have ratings. This is particularly true for many of the private schools listed in this guide. A school may not have ratings because the school:

- Is new and data is not available to calculate ratings.
- Does not administer the PSSA, TerraNova, NWEA MAP, Keystone and/or SAT standardized test exam.
- Does not report academic, attendance and/or school incident data to GPS.

Additionally, Catholic and private schools do not receive a PVAAS report and therefore are not eligible for the High Growth indicator. This does not mean that Catholic and private schools are not demonstrating significant student growth. Rather, there is not currently a system to reliably compare private school growth to district and charter school growth.

Even if a school doesn't have ratings, it may still be great, but speaking with the school becomes even more important. See page 11 for a list of questions to get started.



Data Sources

GreatPhillySchools produces school ratings from data provided by a number of sources, including the Pennsylvania Department of Education (PDE), the School District of Philadelphia (SDP) and the Archdiocese of Philadelphia. For a full list of data sources, search our articles on *greatphillyschools.org/articles*.

The ratings printed in this guide were calculated in March 2020 from the following data sources:

Elementary and Middle Schools (Grades K-8)

Math and Reading (70% of overall score, 35% per subject): Public school ratings are derived from the 2018-19 PSSA exams. For Catholic schools, the TerraNova is used. Other private school ratings are derived from PSSA, TerraNova or NWEA MAP exams. Academic ratings are not issued for private schools that do not administer these tests and/or did not provide their test data to GPS.

Attendance (25% of overall score): Public school Attendance ratings are derived from the percentage of students who attended 95% or more of enrolled instructional days as reported by the School District of Philadelphia's School Performance Report from the 2018–19 academic year. Private schools provide the same attendance data for the 2018–19 academic year directly to GPS. Attendance ratings are not issued for schools that were not in operation during the 2018–19 school year, whose data was unavailable to GPS, or District schools in operation for fewer than three years.

Incidents (5% of overall score): Incidents ratings are derived for public schools from the total number of reportable incidents per 100 students reported to PDE for the 2018–19 school year. Private school ratings are derived from similar reports for 2018–19 submitted directly to GPS. School Incidents ratings are not provided to schools whose data was unavailable or not reported to GPS.

These data sources were not incorporated into the GPS Overall ratings:

Science: Public school Science ratings are derived from the 2018-19 PSSA exams. Science ratings are not issued for private schools that do not administer the PSSA exam.

High Growth Underlying data for this indicator comes from the Pennsylvania Value Added Assessment System (PVAAS). GPS obtained from PVAAS 3-year Average Growth Index (AGI) data in reading and math for each school. Schools with a 3-year AGI of 2.0 or higher in both reading and math receive a High Growth indicator. An AGI of 2.0 indicates significant evidence that the school exceeded the norm for Pennsylvania Academic Growth. This indicator is not a rating and is therefore not factored into a school's Overall rating.

High Schools (Grades 9-12)

Math and Reading (50% of overall score, 25% per subject): Public high school ratings are derived from the 2018–19 Keystone exams. For Catholic high school ratings, the Standard Aptitude Test (SAT) is used. Academic ratings are not issued for private high schools that do not administer the Keystone or SAT exams and/or did not provide their test data to GPS.

Attendance (25% of overall score): Public school Attendance ratings are derived from the percentage of students who attended 95% or more of enrolled instructional days as reported by the School District of Philadelphia's School Performance Report from the 2018–19 academic year. Private schools provide the same attendance data for the 2018–19 academic year directly to GPS. Attendance ratings are not issued for schools that were not in operation during the 2018–19 school year, whose data was unavailable to GPS, or District schools in operation for fewer than three years.

College Bound (20% of overall score): College Bound ratings are derived from 2018-19 college matriculation rates released by the National Student Clearinghouse (NSC) measuring the percentage of 2018 graduates enrolled in any postsecondary institution in the fall immediately following their graduation. Private school ratings are derived from NSC reports submitted directly to GPS. College Bound ratings are not issued for private schools that do not submit this data to GPS.

Incidents (5% of overall score): Incidents ratings are derived for public schools from the total number of reportable incidents per 100 students reported to PDE for the 2018–19 school year. Private school ratings are derived from similar reports for 2018–19 submitted directly to GPS. School Incidents ratings are not provided to schools whose data was unavailable or not reported to GPS.

These data sources were not incorporated into the GPS Overall ratings:

Science: Public school Science ratings are derived from the 2018–19 Keystone exams. Science ratings are not issued for private high schools that do not administer the Keystone exam.

High School Graduation Rates: Public school graduation rates are based on information received from the PDE for the 2018–19 school year. The graduation rate is the percentage of ninth-graders who graduated four years after beginning high school, excluding student transfers. High school graduation rates are reported for private schools only when that data is available to GPS.

High Growth : Underlying data for this indicator comes from the Pennsylvania Value Added Assessment System (PVAAS). GPS obtained from PVAAS 3-year Average Growth Index (AGI) data in reading and math for each school. Schools with a 3-year AGI of 2.0 or higher in both reading and math receive a High Growth indicator. An AGI of 2.0 or higher indicates significant evidence that the school exceeded the norm for Pennsylvania Academic Growth. This indicator is not a rating and is therefore not factored into a school's Overall rating.

NOTE: If there are errors in an official data source, those errors could affect the ratings produced by GPS. Also, it is reasonable to expect that not all data collected by these institutions were tabulated in the same way. GPS ratings are meant to be used as a helpful guide and should not be considered a final judgment about a given school. Our ratings are updated on an annual basis to reflect the most recently available data. In some cases, this may be data prior to the 2018–19 academic year. Our Ratings Are Not the Final Word

GPS ratings help make it easier to find and compare schools in Philadelphia, but they are not intended to be the only factor families use to decide whether a school is a good fit for a particular student. Selecting a school is a personal choice — one that is made on the basis of a student's needs, capabilities and interests.

Consider what you want the outcome(s) to be for your child. Is it developing a passion for school? Overcoming a learning disability? Performing at or above grade level in reading and math? Continuing onto college or a career after graduation? Use the GPS ratings and the information provided by the schools to see if one might fit, but don't stop there. Contact the school and ask for proof of the outcomes you want for your child. For ideas on what to ask during a school visit, see our list of questions starting on page 11.

Keep in mind that GPS ratings only compare schools to one another. Because Philadelphia schools as a whole underperform those in the rest of the state and the nation, an average school here is below average nationally. We hope this won't always be the case, but for now it is the reality.



Find Your Great School

There are many things to consider when selecting a school. Here's our six-step guide to managing and completing the process.

Step 1: Understand Your Timeline

TIP: Check *greatphillyschools.org* for each school's application due date.



It's never too soon to start looking for the right school. Some schools require students to apply nearly a full year before the start of the school year, and some schools have an extensive admissions process. Families interested in private school are encouraged to apply early for financial aid.

Two to Three Years Before Enrolling In Kindergarten (Children Ages 2-3)

- If you're looking for preschool or daycare programs for your child, you can find information on high-quality preschools and daycare centers at greatphillyschools.org.
- Use this guide or greatphillyschools.org to begin searching for schools.
- Visit the schools that seem as though they might be a good fit and speak with principal, teachers, and parents. Use our guide to school visits, beginning on page 11, to help ask the right questions.
- Learn more about the timeline and process to apply to Kindergarten on page 20.

Two to Three Years Before Entering High School (6th and 7th Grades)

- Begin thinking about your options. Use this guide or greatphillyschools.org to begin your search and visit the Philly High School Fair For more information, including event details, see phillyhighschoolfair.com.
- Visit the schools that might be a good fit and speak with principals, teachers and parents. Use our guide on school visits, beginning on page 11, to help ask the right questions.

The Year Before Enrolling in a New School September-November

- The District's application process for elementary, middle and high schools usually opens in September and generally closes in November. It is an online application where you can apply to no more than five schools. Special-admission schools often require additional information, such as transcripts or essays. Students and families can access the District school selection application and additional resources at schoolselect.philasd.org. For more information about the application timeline, visit greatphillyschools.org.
- Visit the Philly High School Fair to learn more about the schools you're considering. More than 100 District, charter and private high schools will have representatives at the fair. For more information, including event details, see phillyhighschoolfair.com.
- Attend the Philly K-8 School Fair, co-hosted by GreatPhillySchools and Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia. More than 100 District, charter and private schools will have representatives at the fair. For more information, including event details, see phillyk8fair.com.
- Every fall, the District releases a list of neighborhood elementary and middle schools that are accepting transfer students from outside the catchment. Any parent interested in having a child attend a school other than their designated neighborhood school must apply though the District school selection application at schoolselect. philasd.org. The application generally closes in November. Many schools do not have space for families outside the catchment. To see this list and learn more about the application timeline, visit greatphillyschools.org.
- Schools begin to hold open houses. Visit greatphillyschools.org/events to find a list.
- Some schools allow prospective students to visit and shadow students. Families should contact schools directly for more information.
- For charter schools, you can fill out a short, online application through Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org). Participating charter schools will begin accepting applications starting on September 25, 2020. A full list of charter schools participating in Apply Philly Charter will be made available on applyphillycharter.org in summer 2020.

- Private schools accept applications and hold entrance and scholarship exams. Learn more about applying to Catholic schools and independent private schools on page 15.
- Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia holds its first scholarship lottery for parents considering private K-8 schools. The priority deadline is November 15, 2020. To apply, visit csfphiladelphia.org.

December-February

- Charter schools accepting applications through Apply Philly Charter have deadlines on January 25, 2021. In February, outcomes of the application will be available on Apply Philly Charter and also communicated directly by schools. Charter schools not participating in Apply Philly Charter may also have deadlines during this time. For more information, visit greatphillyschools.org.
- Kindergarten registration usually opens in late January for District schools. Register early to ensure a placement at your neighborhood school as some schools fill up quickly. See page 22 for more information on how to register for Kindergarten at your neighborhood school.
- District schools with admissions criteria begin to review applications and conduct interviews and auditions.
- Special-admission schools make admissions and waitlist decisions, while citywide schools run admissions lotteries for eligible students.

- The District notifies students about admissions decisions by email. Students are expected to select their preferred school within one week. For more information about the application timeline, visit greatphillyschools.org.
- Most private schools release acceptance, rejection and waitlist decisions.
- After the initial notification, the District works with schools to fill vacancies from waitlists and notifies students about final status.

March-May

- Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia holds its second scholarship lottery for parents considering private schools. Apply by March 1, 2021, to be considered for the 2021-22 school year. To apply, visit csfphiladelphia.org.
- Families who applied to charter schools not participating in Apply Philly Charter may continue to receive admissions decisions during this time.
- Some private schools and charter schools may still be accepting applications; visit greatphillyschools.
 org for a list of schools with available seats.
- Kindergarten registration usually closes in May for District neighborhood schools. See page 22 for more information on how to register for Kindergarten at your neighborhood school.



Step 2: Understand Your Needs

TIP: For help through the school choice process, use the "How to Apply to a K-12 School" Workbook at the back of this guide.



The most effective school search starts with you and your child talking about expectations and requirements. What are your student's strongest subjects? Does your child have an Individualized Education Program (IEP)? See page vii in the "How to Apply to a K-12 School" Workbook (located at the back of this guide) for a list of questions to evaluate your student's strengths, weaknesses, special interests and needs. Use this information in Step 3 to research schools that might be a good fit.

Step 3: Decide What's Important

Now it's time to identify the kind of school environment that will best meet those wants and needs. In addition to good academics and a safe learning environment, decide what other qualities you want in a school and write them down. Here are some examples:

- "The school should be easy to get to." How far are you willing to travel or have your student travel?
- "The school should emphasize tolerance." What values are important to you? How do you want school staff to interact with your child? How should the school focus on building character in addition to teaching academic subjects? Are there codes for conduct and discipline?
- "The school should offer special services and programs." Do you want an emphasis on the arts or sciences? What about extracurricular programs or music?
- "The school should have an active parent group."
 What do you want in the student and parent communities of a school? Is diversity important?

Rank these qualities in order of importance.



Step 4: Find and Compare Your Options

Next you can begin to research school options. There are more than 400 schools in Philadelphia, but don't let that overwhelm you — GreatPhillySchools can help you find the best fit for your student.

To get started, you can use our guide to top-rated elementary and middle schools (page 40) or top-rated high schools (page 139) to pick a few schools to read about, or just start browsing the profiles. Read this brief overview of the types of schools to make sure you understand the many options available to you. Write down the names of schools that seem to be a good match.

Public District Schools

There are currently about 160 public elementary and middle schools and 57 public high schools run by the School District of Philadelphia.

Types of District Schools

Typically, District elementary and middle schools serve grades K through 5, grades K through 8, grades 6 through 8 or some similar grade range. District public high schools serve grades 9 through 12, though some may share a facility with middle-school grades. There are three major types:

- Neighborhood schools are automatically open to students living in the school's "catchment area," or assigned zone. There is no need to apply, although registration is required for students new to the school. Neighborhood schools can be run by the District or by a charter school operator. The District assigns your neighborhood school based on your address. To find your catchment school, use the Find A School search feature on greatphillyschools. org and enter the student's home address. You can also apply to transfer to a neighborhood school outside of your neighborhood. Learn more about this process on page 12.
- Citywide-admission schools are open to any student living in Philadelphia. Students must typically complete a basic application and be entered into a lottery. These schools usually have GPA requirements, but are easier to get into than special-admission schools. Learn more about citywide-admission schools on page 12.
- Special-admission (magnet) schools have admissions requirements, and any student living in Philadelphia can apply through the District. These schools sometimes require an interview. Learn more about the process on page 12.

TIP: Keep in mind that your chances of being selected via the lottery are always higher in the "entry" years. For instance, an elementary school has many more Kindergarten seats than it may have in its second-grade class.

Public Charter Schools

Charter schools, like District schools, are free to all residents of the city.

Charter schools are public schools that operate with a greater level of independence than District schools. They have greater freedom to design classes and to hire and fire teachers, but they still must adhere to certain standards and requirements for public schools. Some charter schools have longer school days, and others may have a longer academic year. It's important to understand the unique aspects of a charter school's program before applying. Many require students to wear uniforms or follow a dress code.

Many charter schools admit students via lottery. Others, called **Renaissance Schools**, are neighborhood schools that must admit all students living within specified boundaries.

Charter schools cannot set minimum grades or test scores for admission; however, they can give preference to younger siblings of currently enrolled students and for certain other special factors.

As of March 2020, there were about 87 charter schools in Philadelphia.

Are Charter Schools Better Than Traditional Public Schools?

Academic performance at charters varies, just as it does at traditional public schools. Some charters are among the highest-performing, and some are among the lowest-performing. It is important to learn about the academic results at schools you may be considering. Visit if you can, and ask the staff what will be expected of your child if they enroll there. Also be sure to ask how the school will support your child if they struggle in class.

Catholic Schools

Catholic schools are an option for all Philadelphia families. They require students to apply for admission and charge annual tuition, but financial aid and scholarships are often available. There is no requirement in any Catholic school that students be Catholic.

There are about 60 Catholic schools in the city, including 51 elementary and middle schools and 12 high schools. There are also special-education schools: Archbishop Ryan Academy for the Deaf and St. Lucy Day School for Children with Visual Impairments. (Two other schools that enroll students with special needs, St. Katherine Day School and Our Lady of Confidence Day School, are located in the suburbs but enroll students from the city.)

Most elementary and middle schools are operated by the local parish, with guidance and support from the Office of Catholic Education, and their admission policies can vary. In all cases it is best to contact the schools directly to learn about their specific admissions policies.

Most Catholic high schools are run by a nonprofit entity called the Faith in the Future Foundation in partnership with the Archdiocese. These schools are not attached to a particular parish and enroll students from across the city. A few schools — St. Joseph's Preparatory School, Cristo Rey Philadelphia High School, Nazareth Academy High School and Mercy Career and Technical High School — are managed independently.

Independent Private Schools

Generally, independent schools own themselves — they are not public or operated by a larger entity, such as the Catholic Church. In this guide, all private schools that are not Catholic are listed as private independent schools.

There are dozens of independent schools in Philadelphia. Independent schools can be coed or single-sex, day school or boarding school, religious or nonsectarian.

Independent schools require that students apply for admission and pay annual tuition, which varies by school. For example, Girard College extends full scholarships to all students, so it is free to attend. Other schools, however, can cost as much as \$30,000 per year. Most independent schools strive to be economically and racially diverse.

Cyber Schools

Cyber schools (also known as virtual schools) use interactive technology and multimedia in place of traditional classrooms. Generally, students complete their schoolwork at home and do not attend classes in a school building. Teachers communicate with students and parents through email, telephone and/or videoconferencing to help students stay on track.

There are about 14 cyber schools in Pennsylvania. As with all public schools, there is no cost to attend cyber schools.

Homeschooling

Homeschooling is an option for families in Philadelphia who prefer to educate their children at home. Pennsylvania law sets the academic requirements for homeschooled students, and education must be provided until students reach the age of 17. Required courses include traditional academic subjects as well as music, art and physical education.

Accelerated Schools

In Philadelphia, accelerated schools are for students up to age 21 who have not completed high school on a traditional path and want to earn a diploma.

Accelerated schools enroll students who are considered at risk of not graduating. They offer classes designed especially for students who have dropped out or fallen far behind, and they provide extra help, tutoring, and career and other types of counseling.

There are about 12 accelerated schools in the School District of Philadelphia. Students can earn credits toward their high school diploma or a GED. All are public schools, and there is no cost to attend.

The next step in the process is visiting the schools. Using the information in our profiles, contact the school(s) to schedule a visit and/or attend an open house. Try to visit during school hours so that you can observe classes and speak to the principal. You want to see an atmosphere that is welcoming and adults who clearly care about the students — but who also expect students to achieve and behave.

The following list of questions can help you get the most out of your time at a school.

Questions for the Principal

- What academic expectations do you have for students?
- What percentage of your students perform on grade level in math and reading?
- What do you believe leads to student achievement? (Watch out for school administrators or teachers who make excuses for low achievement based on such factors as race, income or gender.)
- How many student-related incidents happened in the last year? (Ask for examples.)
- How do you handle student misbehavior? How will I know if there has been a problem with my child?
- How do you assess learning and track progress?
- What will you do if my child falls behind or struggles in class? Will you contact me?
- How do you evaluate your teachers and hold them responsible for student learning?
- Where do students go when they leave your school? When they finish eighth grade, do they attend high-quality high schools? After high school graduation, what percentage attend college?

When Walking the Halls

- How do students behave as they move from class to class?
- Are hallways clean and well-kept? What about the bathrooms?
- Does recent student work appear on walls or bulletin boards?

When Visiting a Classroom

- Watch for student engagement. Are all students paying attention to the teacher or participating in a learning activity?
- Do students seem interested in what they are doing, or do their minds appear to be somewhere else?
- Are there examples of student work and progress on display?
- · Is the classroom clean and orderly?
- Is the teacher pleased to see you?



Step 6: Apply to Schools

Once you have completed your visits and reviewed your notes, it's time to decide which school(s) to apply to. We have listed the basic procedures for applying to each type of school below. If you haven't heard anything back from a school after two weeks or so, follow up to make sure they have your application and any other required materials or information. Ask when you will receive an answer about whether your child will be accepted or enrolled.

How to Apply to a Public District School

Citywide- and Special-Admission Schools

Some District schools citywide admission schools and special-admission schools do not have an assigned neighborhood zone; they are open to any student living in Philadelphia.

Citywide admission schools may have grade, attendance, or behavior requirements, but are often easier to get into than special-admission schools. Students are selected by lottery.

Special-admission middle and high schools, also called magnet schools, have entrance requirements. Students are selected based on attendance, behavior, grades and standardized test scores. Some schools require an interview or audition (for arts-focused schools). These schools are competitive and some receive thousands of applications every year, so it is important to research each school and have backup choices.

Students interested in citywide- or special-admission schools must apply through the District's online application. To apply for the 2021-22 school year, the application is generally due in November. Students can apply to up to five schools, not including their neighborhood school.

First-Time Registration for Your Neighborhood School

You have to register to attend a Philadelphia District school if your student is:

- A new resident of the city
- Transferring from a private, Catholic or other public school
- A student entering Kindergarten (or entering school for the first time)

District Kindergarten registration generally begins in late January before the school year that your child will be entering Kindergarten and usually closes in late May. While Pennsylvania state law does not require that children enroll in school until age 8, they are eligible for Kindergarten enrollment if they are 5 years old by September 1st of the year they are entering school. See page 20 for more details on Kindergarten, including how to register at your District neighborhood school.

If your student is new to the District and is enrolling in grades 1-12, neighborhood schools are open for registration during the two weeks prior to the start of school. Visit *philasd.org/studentplacement* for the documentation needed to register.

TIP: If you are interested in enrolling at a District school other than your assigned neighborhood school, you should start that process a full year earlier through the School Selection Process application at *schoolselect.philasd.org*. Learn more about the timeline to apply on *greatphillyschools.org*.



Transferring Between Neighborhood Schools

Only schools that anticipate having extra space are open for transfer. Prior to the opening of the School Selection Process, the District releases a list of elementary, middle and high schools accepting applications, which will be available at *philasd.org/studentplacement*. Selection for applicants outside of the school's neighborhood "catchment" zone is made by lottery. All high school students attending schools 1.5 miles or more from their home receive a SEPTA TransPass free of charge, but in some cases the travel time to and from home places a burden on students and families. Families should be aware that few students are admitted to high-performing neighborhood schools through the transfer process, so it is best to have multiple options.

In order to apply, students should complete the District's application, usually due in November. Do not list your designated neighborhood school as one of your five choices. If you would like to attend a different neighborhood school or a citywide- or special-admission school, you must apply by the application deadline. To learn more about the timeline, visit greatphillyschools.org.

Emergency transfers are available in rare cases, usually when a student feels unsafe or threatened and can provide documentation, such as a police report. There must also be a record of past efforts by the school and families to remedy the situation. These transfers are initiated through the school and can usually be arranged in a matter of weeks.

Frequently Asked Questions

How can I find out the admissions requirements for a particular school? High school profiles in this guide include the admissions policies. To find admissions policies for elementary and middle schools, visit the school's profile on *greatphillyschools.org*. The student's guidance counselor can help explain the requirements.

If a student doesn't meet the exact criteria of a selective school, should they apply anyway? Yes, but only if the student's record comes close to meeting all the requirements. Schools sometimes admit students who do not meet every criterion. Principals at selective schools may seek recommendations from the student's current counselor and principal. Interviews can also make a big difference.

Certain schools have lots of applicants. How can a student improve their chances? Before a student applies to a school with a high number of applicants, like Masterman, keep in mind that nearly all of its high school slots are filled by students from its middle school — the odds may be one in a hundred. Some of the other most selective schools may admit only one out of every 10 applicants. But other city schools that are not as well known have similar programs. Check them out. Applying to charter schools is another way of improving the odds; students are not limited in how many they can apply to, so it's worth it to apply to a school with a low acceptance rate.

If a student is placed on a waitlist, what should they do? If a student is placed on the waitlist, there is still a chance of admission. Keep in touch with the student's counselor and the desired school.

A student who is not offered a place during the additional lottery rounds should register to attend their neighborhood school and check *greatphillyschools.org* for other options.

Are there high schools that will help prepare students for a trade or career? Yes, there are about 115 state-approved career and technical education programs in Philadelphia, some of which lead to a certificate or credential along with a diploma that can help graduates in the job market. In state-approved programs students take academic and technical courses in their chosen field for three years (beginning in 10th grade). The programs are on the Philadelphia Workforce Investment Board's High Priority Occupations list, which indicates that the program is meeting the workforce development needs of the region. See page 26 for information on CTE programs.

Do any neighborhood high schools have special programs? Many neighborhood schools house special programs in such areas as health occupations, culinary arts, criminal justice, communications and automotive technology. You can find a list of CTE programs beginning on page 28.

Can a student apply to a neighborhood school in another area? Yes. Keep in mind that students outside of a school's catchment area are selected by lottery — and only if students inside the assigned zone don't fill the school. Call the school to find out if they usually have space available so that you can make the most of your five District application choices.

Should a student with an IEP apply to selective high schools? All students are encouraged to apply to any high school that interests them and for which they meet the basic qualifications. A court decision that resulted in the LeGare Consent Decree requires the District to maintain a minimum percentage of students who have an Individualized Education Program (IEP) in selective schools. Learn more about the LeGare process on page 17. There are separate lotteries for special-ed students and English Learners (ELs) at the schools that have lotteries.

What are the rules for English Learners? All schools are required to serve English Learners (ELs), and the District encourages EL students to apply to selective schools. A court order called the YS Stipulation requires the District to maintain a minimum percentage of English Learners in selective schools and bars schools from denying qualified ELs admission by claiming a lack of services. But some schools provide better EL education than others. If you are an EL student, insist that a school show you or your family its state test results in reading and writing for EL students only. If a majority of EL students are not proficient in reading or writing by 11th grade, that is an indication of a weak EL program. See page 18 for information on EL education.

Besides their counselor, where else can a student get help with the school choice process? Contact GreatPhillySchools at info@greatphillyschools.org.

Applications, school directories and explanations of the policies and procedures for the selection process are available at Parent and Family Resource Centers around the city; see *philasd.org* to find the nearest center.

The Application Process

To transfer between neighborhood schools or to apply to a citywide- or special-admission school, complete the District's School Selection Application, available online at *schoolselect.philasd.org*. This application usually opens in September and generally closes in November. To learn more details about the application timeline, visit *greatphillyschools.org*.


How to Apply to a Public Charter School

There are two basic types of charter schools in Philadelphia: traditional charter schools and Renaissance charter schools. Traditional charter schools can enroll students from any part of the city; however, if a charter school receives more applications than the number of available seats in a certain grade, they must offer seats through a random selection process ("lottery"). Some schools offer preferences for certain groups of applicants (for example, siblings). Renaissance charter schools must enroll all students living in a designated neighborhood.

Charter schools cannot deny application or admission to students because of their grades, race, income or special needs.

Apply Philly Charter

After you decide which charter schools you want to apply to, the next step is to fill out a short, online application through Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org). Apply Philly Charter is a website where you can easily apply to most Philadelphia charter schools for the 2021–22 school year, starting on September 25, 2020. The deadline to apply for the 2021–22 school lottery is January 25, 2021.



Applying to charter schools using Apply Philly Charter is easy. You can apply to participating charter schools using your smartphone, desktop computer, tablet, or even phone. Once you're on the website, you can create a secure profile and enter basic contact and grade-level information about your student, then choose which charter schools you want to apply to.

All applications submitted through Apply Philly Charter will be sent to the charter schools listed on the student's application. In February, families will be able to log in to Apply Philly Charter to view the outcome of their application(s). Families will also be contacted directly by schools about the outcome of their application(s). If offered a seat, you should notify the school of your decision to accept and follow all steps to enroll your student and notify other schools of your decision. If you are waitlisted, knowing your placement on the list will help you understand your chances of being offered a seat. The school will contact you directly if your waitlist status changes.

More information about Apply Philly Charter — including participating charter schools and application timeline information — can be found on applyphillycharter.org in summer 2020.

Note that during the school selection window starting in fall 2020 (for families applying for the 2021-22 school year), not all charter schools in Philadelphia will participate in Apply Philly Charter. You can still apply to those schools by visiting their websites and filling out their own applications. Visit *greatphillyschools.* org to find all charter school application deadlines and information to apply. A full list of charter schools participating in Apply Philly Charter will be made available on applyphillycharter.org in summer 2020.

Renaissance Schools

Renaissance Schools are formerly low-performing District schools that the School District of Philadelphia has selected as "turnaround" schools and converted into charters. Like any other charter school, Renaissance Schools operate with increased freedom. However, like traditional public schools, Renaissance Schools are required to enroll all students living within designated neighborhood boundaries. The enrollment process for Renaissance Schools is the same as that for District schools. As of the 2019-20 school year, there were about 3 Renaissance high schools and 22 Renaissance elementary and middle schools in Philadelphia.

How to Apply to a Catholic School

Students must apply to attend a Catholic school. The details of the admissions process vary, but it generally includes an application, entrance test and interview. The entrance exam is offered on multiple dates from October through December. Admissions decisions are made by early spring. Depending on enrollment, a school may accept late applications until the start of a new school year.

Catholic elementary and middle schools operated by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia have their own individual applications. Visit the school's profile on *greatphillyschools.org* for more information. To apply to Catholic schools operated by Independence Mission Schools, visit *independencemissionschools.org*. Catholic high schools operated by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia have a unified application. To apply, visit *aopcatholicschools.org/universal-application*.

How to Apply to an Independent Private School

The admissions process is different at each independent school. Many schools require that families attend an open house before applying. Applications often require a recommendation from a teacher and a copy of your child's grades from their current school.



Specialized Services

Special Education **Programs**

Children with disabilities have special rights in public schools (including charter schools), which require schools to provide services and supports to address their unique needs. Public schools create an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or 504 plan to provide special education to meet the particular needs of a child with a disability at no cost to the child's parents or caregivers.

Finding a great school for your child with an IEP or 504 plan starts with determining their needs. See page 2 to learn about researching schools using GreatPhillySchools.

Students with an IEP or 504 plan should consider all school types: public District, public charter, private Catholic and private independent. However, there are different rules for what services and supports the school types must provide for children with disabilities. Public District and public charter schools are required to provide your child with the educational services listed in their IEP or 504 plan.

All public schools (including charter schools) are required to serve children with disabilities. Your child's IEP team or 504 team, which includes you, will determine the support program and service levels needed for your child to make progress. Just like other educational programs, special education programs may vary from school to school. It is important to visit any school you are considering, or has been proposed, for your child in order to learn more about the programs that are offered. You may wish to speak with the Special Education Liaison (SEL) or special education department head to learn more about the school.

Children with disabilities must have an equal opportunity to participate in the admissions process for public high schools. Some public schools have selective admissions requirements, such as minimum standardized test scores or attendance records. If your child has an IEP or 504 plan and you are interested in applying to a school with selective admissions requirements, you should contact your child's school counselor about the LeGare process.

The LeGare process sets different admissions criteria for children with disabilities to ensure that they are not discriminated against in high school admissions. The school counselor or case manager will prepare a LeGare folder that will include additional information about your child that is necessary for the admissions process. If you have questions about the LeGare process for high school admission, you can email <code>legare@philasd.org</code> or contact the Office of Specialized Services at 215-400-4170 or email <code>specializedservices@philasd.org</code>.

Unless a child with a disability is enrolled in a private school by a public District or charter school, private schools are not required to provide special education under an IEP. However, most private schools accept children with many types of disabilities and may provide additional academic and behavioral supports to these children. You should contact individual schools to discuss your child's IEP or 504 plan and the available supports.

Regardless of which school type you select, it is important to stay involved in your child's education to assure your child's needs are met. The school should regularly update you on your child's progress. For public schools implementing an IEP, you must receive updates about your child's progress toward the goals established in the IEP. By state and federal law, public schools must also begin transition planning for students with an IEP by age 14. Transition planning must include supports for a student's education and/or training for high school and to seek opportunities after graduation.

If you feel your child is not receiving the proper special education services, contact the Education Law Center at 215-238-6970 to receive free special education legal information. To learn more about specialized education programs and to view a list of frequently asked questions, visit *greatphillyschools.org/articles*.

If your child does not have an IEP, but you think that your child may need specialized services, speak first with your child's teacher. Discuss your observations and concerns about your child's learning progress. You or the school may request an evaluation. See page 17 to learn about the evaluation process.

Special Education Evaluation Process

You, as a parent or guardian, are the expert on your child. If you are concerned that your child has a disability or is not making progress, it is important to understand how to start the process to obtain additional support for your child in the classroom. The special education evaluation process can be the first step in finding out what supports your child needs.

- 1. Request an evaluation. To begin the evaluation process, you should submit a written request for evaluation to a school official, such as the school principal or counselor, with the date included. The school must either send you: (1) a Permission to Evaluate-Consent Form (PTE), which explains the reasons for the evaluation, any records or reports the school will use, and the specific types of tests that the school district will do; or (2) written notice, which explains why the school will not evaluate your child. Alternatively, the school can request the evaluation, but you still must sign the PTE to begin the evaluation.
- 2. Participate in the evaluation. Within 60 calendar days (not including summer months) of receiving the PTE, the school must complete all assessments of your child and provide you with an Evaluation Report. The assessment process may involve testing, interviews, observations, and a review of the student's academic records and work. You can also provide information from outside medical or other professionals who know your child. Your child will be eligible for special education if they: (1) meet the definition of one of the disability categories and (2) need specialized instruction and related services because of the disability.
- 3. Create the IEP. If your child is eligible to receive special education, you must meet with the IEP team to establish and write the annual plan. The school must set up the meeting within 30 calendar days after issuing the Evaluation Report. The IEP should include educational services to address all of your child's unique needs. Parents and guardians are an important part of the IEP team and must be invited to all IEP meetings. You should attend the meetings or request to reschedule them so that you can help plan for your child.
- 4. Review the NOREP. After the meeting, the school will provide you with the Notice of Recommended Educational Placement (NOREP) explaining the placement and educational services offered to your child in the IEP. The NOREP should be consistent with the plan that was discussed at the meeting.

Typically, the NOREP explains services that will be provided at your child's current school. However, if your child requires a specialized program that is not provided at the current school, the NOREP could explain that your child will be transferred to a different school. You must indicate on the NOREP whether you agree with the proposed plan and return it to the school within 10 calendar days.

- If you disagree, you may request a meeting with school officials, mediation, or a due process hearing.
- If you do not want your child to change to the educational program listed in the NOREP, you should request mediation or a due process hearing to freeze the placement. This is called *pendency*. You can learn more about pendency, as well as requesting mediation or a due process hearing, by visiting the Office of Dispute Resolution at *odr-pa.org* or contacting the Office of Dispute Resolution's ConsultLine at 800-879-2301.
- 5. Implement the IEP. If you do not request mediation or a due process hearing, the school must begin providing the services written in the IEP as soon as possible but no later than 10 school days after the school issues the NOREP.
- 6. Review the plan at least annually. The school must meet to review the IEP at least once a year, but it should provide you with reports of progress throughout the school year. You can request an IEP meeting at any time to discuss any concerns. In addition, the school must reevaluate your child at least once every three years (or every two years for children with intellectual disabilities) or as needed based on your child's progress.

English Learner
Education

Federal and state laws require public schools (including charter schools) to offer special classes and support to students and families who do not speak English as a primary or native language. These students are said to have Limited English Proficiency (LEP), and are known as English Learners (ELs).

The goal of an EL education is to help students do better in school by improving their listening, speaking, reading and writing skills in English and by helping them understand English-language culture. There are approximately 15,000 English language learners in pre-K through 12th grade in the Philadelphia school system.

The amount and types of instruction and support that schools must provide to ELs depend on how well they can currently understand, speak, read and write in English. Students who speak no English may receive up to three hours a day of direct language instruction, while students who are nearly proficient may receive an hour or less per day. In Philadelphia, these classes are known as English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL), but they are also called English as a Second Language (ESL).

When ELs are in regular classrooms, teachers must adapt their lessons to make sure that ELs understand the material. ELs may also receive special help during standardized tests, which may include having directions given to them in their primary language. Schools may not exclude ELs from special academic programs (such as gifted or technical education), school counseling or extracurricular activities.

How to Apply to Kindergarten

The start of Kindergarten is an exciting time for families, but did you know that the process of selecting one should start nearly a full year in advance? Finding a great Kindergarten program is one of the most important ways to set your child up for academic success, so we have compiled some helpful resources to make this process easier.

Why Kindergarten?

Though Kindergarten is not mandatory in Pennsylvania, it is a vital part of a child's education and adult success. Research has shown that students who have participated in a high-quality Kindergarten program are more likely than their peers to go on to college and ultimately find higher-paying jobs in adulthood. Students who complete Kindergarten begin first grade more prepared than their peers and have had time to socialize and adjust to an academic learning environment.

We encourage families to consider a variety of school options for Kindergarten: public neighborhood, public charter, private independent and private Catholic. Learn more about the different school options on page 9.

Kindergarten Eligibility

To register for a public school, your child must be 5 years old by September 1st of the year they would start school. If your child will be 6 on September 1st, you can provide a written request to enroll them in Kindergarten instead of first grade.

All parents are eligible to enroll their children in a public Kindergarten class. Because spaces in popular neighborhood and charter schools tend to fill up quickly, all parents should start the Kindergarten application process a year in advance. By starting earlier, you provide your child with more school options. Learn about the timeline on page 21.

Application Timeline for Kindergarten

For Kindergarten students starting in the 2021-22 school year:

September-January

- Attend the Philly K-8 School Fair: Learn about charter, District and private school options by attending the Philly K-8 School Fair. Visit phillyk8fair. com for more information, including event details.
- Most private school financial aid applications:
 Most private schools accept applications through
 the spring, but their financial aid can be exhausted
 as early as the winter before. Private schools can be
 a great option for families, but if your enrollment
 is dependent on financial assistance, begin that
 discussion by meeting with the school's financial aid
 office and completing your application in the fall.
 You can apply to as many schools as you want, then
 decide later which school is right for your child.
- Apply to District schools outside of your neighborhood school: If you would like to attend a District school other than your assigned neighborhood school, you must fill out a separate application form online at schoolselect.philasd.org. This application usually opens in September and generally closes in November. Because some schools have limited space (or are overenrolled), the District releases a list of schools with Kindergarten seats available to children who live outside of the schools' neighborhood catchment. Visit greatphillyschools. org to find a list of these schools and read more about the process to apply on page 12.
- Apply for scholarships with the Children's Scholarship Fund: If you are interested in private schools, the Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia provides free, lottery-based scholarships for parents of K-8 students. The scholarships last four years and can be applied to many private schools. Visit csfphiladelphia.org to learn more and complete a short application. For the best odds, apply by the priority deadline on November 15, 2020. A second lottery will be held for applications received up to March 1, 2021.
- Apply to charter schools: You can apply to most charter schools on one website: applyphillycharter. org! Participating charter schools will accept applications through Apply Philly Charter beginning September 25, 2020 through January 25, 2021. Not all charter schools accept applications through Apply Philly Charter and may have different application deadlines. Visit greatphillyschools.org for more information.

February-May

- Apply to private schools: Priority admissions deadlines for most private schools fall in this time. A parent interview or school visit may be required. Many schools require application fees. If paying the fee is a hardship, ask if the school offers waivers.
- Receive your District application results: If you applied for schools other than your neighborhood school by completing an online application, you should receive your results in January (see timeline details at *greatphillyschools.org*). Some schools receive more applications than they have space and might not be able to offer you a spot. If you are accepted into any school other than your neighborhood school, you must confirm that you want to attend the school within a week.
- Pregister for your District neighborhood school:
 District schools have limited space for Kindergarten.
 To ensure a space at your neighborhood school, register as early as possible. Registration typically opens in January and closes at the end of May, but popular schools often fill up early. If your school's Kindergarten class is full, you will be placed on a waitlist and assigned to a nearby school with space.

- Attend open houses: Schools offer open house visitation times for prospective families. You can find a list of dates at greatphillyschools.org/events.
- Charter schools hold lotteries and notify parents of acceptances: Each school holds its own lottery; many are public and open for you to attend. In February, families who applied to charter schools through Apply Philly Charter will be able to log in to the site to view the outcome of their application(s). Families will also be contacted directly by schools. Charter schools not participating in Apply Philly Charter may also notify families during this time. If your child is placed on a waitlist, you may receive an offer later in the year. Speak with the school directly about your chances.
- Early registration closes for District schools: Kindergarten registration typically closes at the end of May. After the end of May, you can still register for Kindergarten by visiting your neighborhood school — as long as there is space available. Visit your school's front office or call to speak with the secretary to ensure that there is room for your child. Learn more about how to register at your District neighborhood school on page 22.

How to Register for Kindergarten at Your Neighborhood School

Identify Your Options

Though Kindergarten is not required, the District provides free Kindergarten for Philadelphia families. GreatPhillySchools offers the starting point for your school research and a reference to help you understand and compare your options. Visit *greatphillyschools.org* to learn more.

All families are eligible to enroll their child at a District neighborhood school. First, identify your catchment school by entering the student's home address in the Find a School search feature on *greatphillyschools.org*.

If you would like to attend a District school other than your assigned neighborhood school, you must fill out a separate application form online through the School Selection Process. The deadline to complete this form is generally in November. Visit *schoolselect.philasd.org* for more information. If your child is offered a seat, you will need to follow all steps to register and enroll in the school.

Gather Your Documents

To register for Kindergarten, you must provide the following documents:

- Proof of your child's age: Examples include birth or baptismal certificate, passport, prior school records indicating date of birth.
- Proof of address (2 documents): Examples include a lease, deed, valid state drivers or photo identification, or utility bills with your name and address. For more examples, visit bit.ly/SDP-Kinder.
- Immunization records: Ask your child's physician for these records. Students are exempt from this requirement if a physician provides a written statement that immunizations would be detrimental to the health of the child and/or the parent/ guardian submits a written document objecting to immunization on religious grounds or strong moral/ ethical conviction.

 Registration forms: These forms can be filled out at the school or completed at home. Visit philasd.org/ studentplacement to access the EH-40 document online.

Though not required for registration, schools may request:

- Valid photo ID of the parent or guardian, such as a drivers license, passport or state photo identification card.
- Child's previous school information, if applicable.

Register at the School

Call ahead to make sure someone will be present at the school. Plan 30 minutes to one hour, as you may need to wait or complete additional paperwork. Tip: The best time to visit is during the middle of the day. Staff is generally very busy during student arrival and dismissal times. You can speed up the process by filling out the Registration Forms (EH-40 document) ahead of time. Visit *philasd.org/studentplacement* to find this document.

Special Education and Accommodations

If you believe your child may need special learning accommodations, speak directly to the school. Many schools – including private schools – will work with your child to determine the best methods of support. In some cases, this may mean working with you to draft an Individualized Education Program (IEP). Learn more about this process on page 17.

Transitioning from an Early Intervention Program

Children planning to attend a District or charter school may be eligible to transition preschool special education services prior to starting Kindergarten. The transition process begins one year before your child is eligible for Kindergarten (or 1st grade if the child does not attend Kindergarten).

The goal of the Early Intervention transition process is to determine the levels of special education services your child will need for Kindergarten by the beginning of the school year. As the District evaluation process can be lengthy, eligible children can have an established IEP that will provide support first while seeking a reevaluation with the District or charter school.

Private schools have their own independent process to establish the level of supports offered to students needing special education services. For more information, contact the school directly.

For eligible preschool children ages 3 to 5 years old living in Philadelphia and areas of Delaware County, Elwyn SEEDS provides Preschool Early Intervention testing and coordinates support services. When children with Early Intervention services are of school age, Elwyn SEEDS coordinates the Transition to Kindergarten process, which begins a year prior to starting Kindergarten.

1. Complete the Intent to Register Form. This form will be shared with families who have children eligible for Kindergarten or 1st grade. By indicating your plan to register your child at a District or charter school, Elwyn SEEDS sends your child's preschool evaluation and IEP to your District or charter school and proceeds with the transition process.

2. Receive Notice of Transition Process Options.

After reviewing your child's documents, the District or charter school will notify the parents in writing with the options available. These options are (a) adopt the Early Intervention IEP for school, (b) adopt the Early Intervention IEP with revisions, or (c) conduct a reevaluation to establish a new IEP.

- 3. Attend the Transition Meeting. The purpose of this meeting is to discuss your child's options in person with the Early Intervention staff and District/charter staff.
- **4.Register at your Neighborhood School.** Your child must be registered and enrolled in a District or charter school. Read about the timeline on page 21 and how to register at your neighborhood school on page 22.
- 5. Complete the Permission to Re-Evaluate Form (PTRE). While eligible children must have an IEP in place by the beginning of the school year, the District will also require a reevaluation. After receiving this signed form, the District can begin the reevaluation process. Learn about this process on page 17.

IMPORTANT NOTE: As the services available at different schools vary, your student could be placed at a different school to receive the appropriate supports in his/her IEP.

Frequently Asked Questions

How old does my child need to be to register?

To register for a public school, your child must be 5 years old by September 1st of the year they would start school. If your child will be 6 on September 1st, you can provide a written request to enroll them in Kindergarten instead of first grade — or you can skip Kindergarten and enroll directly in first grade.

What paperwork is required to register for Kindergarten at my neighborhood school?

See page 22 for the list of required documents to register at your District neighborhood school.

What paperwork do I need to apply to Kindergarten at a charter school?

You do not need to submit registration paperwork to apply to a charter school. Most charter schools accept a simple online application through Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org) for entry into their lottery. Only if you are offered a seat and want to attend the school are you expected to provide paperwork. Increase your options by applying to more schools; you'll have a chance to choose once you know whether or not your child has been accepted.

Should I register at my District neighborhood school?

Yes. The District provides free Kindergarten for Philadelphia families — but the space available at each school varies. When a school runs out of space, the District will place your child on the waitlist for your local school and refer you to a nearby school that still has space.

Registration typically opens in mid-January and closes at the end of May. Registering early assures your child a spot at your local school, even if you are still considering other options. Most charter school decisions will not be made before February, at which point your neighborhood school may already be full. Read more on how to register at your neighborhood school on page 22.

Is private school an option for me?

Private schools can seem out of reach for many families, but there is a wide range of tuition rates — and financial aid — available. Visit *greatphillyschools.org* to find out a private school's average tuition rate, but avoid sticker shock! Some of the most expensive schools are also the biggest providers of financial aid, making it possible for families with varying levels of income to attend. Some schools even offer a tuition-free experience for all of their students.

The fall before school starts is the best opportunity to apply for financial aid. Families who meet certain income requirements can also apply for lottery-based K-8 scholarships through Children's Scholarship Fund Philadelphia. Families who are selected receive tuition assistance for four years. The deadline to apply is March 1, 2021. Visit *csfphiladelphia.org* for more information.

Do schools accept more applicants in Kindergarten than in other grades?

Applying in Kindergarten gives you the best opportunity to be selected for a school of your choice. Consider, for instance, a charter school that includes grades K to 5. In Kindergarten, the school holds its lottery for all 50 spaces it has available. The school expects about 44 of those students to continue on to first grade, leaving only six spaces available for new families. Similarly, District schools typically have fewer spaces for transfer students in higher grades.

Some schools, including many private Catholic schools, begin in pre-K, making it even more important to consider your options early.

Do schools provide transportation for Kindergarten?

Unfortunately, because Kindergarten is not mandatory in Pennsylvania, schools are not required to provide transportation unless it is included in the child's IEP. District schools do not provide transportation for Kindergarten, and most charter schools begin busing in first grade. A small number of charter schools, however, will allow younger siblings to ride on buses with older siblings. This is decided on a case-by-case basis, making it important to ask the school directly. Private schools typically do not provide free transportation.



Career and Technical Education (CTE)

The School District of Philadelphia's career and technical education (CTE) programs offer high school students an academic education while providing hands-on training in 40 high-priority and high-employment job areas. More than 6,700 students in Philadelphia participate in a CTE program.

Depending on the program, students take a full load of regular or college-preparatory classes while receiving 1,080 hours of technical training and instruction in professional and personal skills.

Students visit local businesses, take part in mock interviews, have an opportunity to gain real-world experience with internships and co-op positions during their senior year, and frequently find paying summer jobs that use and build their growing skills.

Benefits

In many programs, students who successfully complete their chosen course of study receive an industry-recognized certification, which enhances their chances of employment after graduation. Students may also earn up to 12 free college credits accepted at many colleges and universities in Pennsylvania. Students are still required to complete the same graduation requirements as a traditional student and will leave high school with a diploma.

In addition to these career benefits, a 2015 District evaluation showed that students enrolled in CTE tracks are more likely to graduate on time. They also leave school more likely to excel in areas such as goal-setting, planning and staying engaged with classes.

Applying

All CTE programs within the School District of Philadelphia are considered citywide-admission programs and accept applications through the District's School Selection Process. This application usually opens in September and generally closes in November. There are no entrance requirements for incoming students, but students must apply through schoolselect.philasd.org. See page 12 to learn more

about the School Selection Process to apply to District schools.

There are five high schools (Dobbins, Mastbaum, Randolph, Swenson and Saul) that specialize in career and technical education. All other programs are part of an existing school, many of which are large neighborhood high schools. These programs accept students citywide, and students should apply to these programs directly. Listings for all CTE programs begin on page 28.

For most programs, students will begin taking classes in 10th grade — meaning that students may apply to a school in 9th grade and take only regular classes for a year. For students currently in a neighborhood high school, there may be space to transfer into a CTE program housed within your school; speak to your school directly to find out more.

Programs of Study

Some CTE programs are available at multiple schools throughout the city, while others are restricted to one or two locations. See the listings beginning on page 28 or the District's latest High School Directory for specifics at *philasd.org/studentplacement*.

District Schools

District schools are free public schools operated by the School District of Philadelphia. To apply to a school outside of your assigned neighborhood school, you must submit an application through the School Selection Process on *schoolselect.philasd.org*. You can select up to five options, so choose carefully where to apply.

See pages xi-xii for instructions to apply.

Citywide-Admission Schools

Sometimes have GPA or attendance requirements, but are generally easier to get into than special-admission schools. Students must apply and are selected through a lottery system.

High schools only: All Career and Technical Education (CTE) programs are citywide-admissions and do not have entrance requirements for incoming students.

Special-Admission (Magnet) Schools

Have academic, behavioral and attendance requirements. Students must apply and generally must have high scores on PSSAs, especially in 7th grade for high school admission. They may require additional application materials, such as essays or interviews. Schools review student applications and issue acceptances or rejections.

Neighborhood Schools

Are automatically open to students living in the school's "catchment" or neighborhood zone. If you live within the catchment, your student is given preference to attend. To attend your designated neighborhood school, register directly with the school with proof of residency to enroll. To attend a different neighborhood school, students must apply.

Kindergarten only: District schools have limited space for Kindergarten and open for registration on a specific timeline. To ensure a space at your neighborhood school, register as early as possible. See pages 21-22 for the Kindergarten timeline and instructions to register.

TIP

Pay attention to a school's grade levels — you often have a higher chance of admission at the lowest grade level. For example, if a school serving grades 6-12 already has an 8th-grade class, it may have limited spaces for new 9th graders to enroll; however, there may be more open spaces in the 6th grade.

Charter Schools

Charter schools are free, independently operated public schools. They cannot have academic or behavioral requirements for admission, and there is no application fee. You can apply to as many charter schools as you like.

All charter schools require an application and many hold a lottery to fill their available spaces. If you are offered a spot, the school will contact you with steps to enroll. If you are not selected, you will be placed on the waitlist and must reapply the following year if you are not offered a seat from the waitlist. Many accept applications through Apply Philly Charter (applyphillycharter.org), due by January 25, 2021. Other charter schools have their own applications and deadlines. Visit greatphillyschools.org to find all charter school application deadlines.

Public Charter Citywide Schools

Enroll students from any part of the city, with a lottery to offer admission.

Public Charter Neighborhood ("Renaissance") Schools

Enroll students in their neighborhood "catchment" boundaries. If they have additional open seats, students from outside of their neighborhood are selected through a lottery system.

Private Schools

Most private schools require students to apply for admission and generally charge an application fee. A large majority charge annual tuition, but financial aid and scholarships are often available. Schools will issue acceptance, waitlist, or rejection notices to families. Schools may be coed or single-sex, day school or boarding school, religious or non-sectarian.

Catholic Schools

Are open to students of all religions, though they promote Catholic values. The majority are operated by the Archdiocese of Philadelphia though some are organized by Independence Mission Schools or independently. The admissions requirements and deadlines vary by school, but some may require school records, entrance exams or interviews. See pages xiii-xiv for instructions to apply to Catholic Archdiocese schools.

Independent Schools

Are operated independently according to a wide range of instructional types. The admissions requirements and deadlines vary by school, but some may require entrance exams, interviews or religious affiliation.

TIP

Don't let a school's "sticker price" scare you off. Many of schools with the highest tuition also offer the most generous financial aid. If you're interested in a school, set up a time to discuss your options with the admissions director. Schools usually award financial aid on a rolling basis, so apply for aid early.

It's never too soon to start looking for the right school! Knowing your timeline will help you stay on top of application deadlines the multi-step processes. For example, some schools require students to apply nearly a full year before the start of the school year. For other schools, such as private schools, applying early improves your chances of receiving financial aid.

Step 5: Visit Schools

Once you have narrowed down your top choices, it's time to visit schools.

Try to visit during school hours so that you can observe classes and speak to teachers and the principal. Some schools may have open houses or offer your student to "shadow" another student for an entire school day visit.

Step 6: Apply to Schools

Once you have completed your visits and reviewed your notes, it's time to decide which school(s) to apply to. In the next pages, we have listed the basic procedures for applying to schools associated with the School District of Philadelphia, the Archdiocese of Philadelphia and Apply Philly Charter.

If you haven't heard anything back from a school after two weeks or so, follow up to make sure they have your application and any other required materials or information. Ask when you will receive an answer about whether your student will be accepted or enrolled.

TIP

Don't limit yourself! You can apply to more than one type of school, and applying does not necessarily mean your child must attend that school if they are admitted. You have the option of applying to multiple types of schools, and then making your choice later.


